It has been lovely to see the sunshine appearing over the last few days and we are hopeful that this means that we are heading towards lighter mornings and lighter evenings.

**Curriculum** – In our staff meeting this week we have been looking at 'Zones of regulation' and helping children to regulate themselves and role modelling this for them. The pandemic has caused some anxiety for children in different ways and so we are keen to help the children to regulate themselves through issues that they may have.

**Eco** Schools – The Lions have kindly given us a free copy of "Marli's Tangles Tale" which is about the problem of balloon releases and plastic in our oceans. "Duffy's Lucky Escape" which is about plastic in our oceans and "Nelson's Dangerous Dive" which again is about plastic pollution. We will be sharing them in classes over the next few weeks.

**Worship this week** –This week in worship we looked at service and we talked about people who help us. Some of UK class came dressed as police, nurses, doctor and a paramedic and we were able to think about what they do for us. We linked the people that help us to the 'Healing of the lame' and we were able to then reflect about how we might serve each other, our classes and our communities. 

All the classes have challenge tasks to stretch them if they need it in Maths and they are linked to different areas in Maths to help with long term memory and retrieval of information.




**Year 3** have been looking at Ordnance Survey maps as part of their geography learning and focussed on looking for features.


## **READ TOGETHER...** Queen Esther serves her people

When King Xerxes, the ruler of the mighty land of Persia, was looking for a wife, Mordecai immediately thought of his cousin, the wise and beautiful Esther. Mordecai's family was Jewish, but he warned Esther not to tell anyone about this as he knew that there were powerful people in the land who hated Jews. Mordecai took Esther to the palace gates to be presented to the king, and, sure enough, as soon as King Xerxes saw Esther he fell in love with her, and the humble Jewish girl became a queen.

Mordecai often sat by the palace gates hoping to hear snippets of news about his cousin. For some time, all seemed well. But Haman, a wicked and powerful man in the court of King Xerxes, became angry with Mordecai because he would not bow down and honour him. Haman hatched a cunning plan. He began to tell the King bad things about the Jews living in his land and eventually he persuaded Xerxes that all the Jews should be killed. Queen Esther was beside herself with grief. She loved her people very much but felt powerless to help them.

King Xerxes noticed how terribly sad his queen had become, and begged her to tell him why she was so upset. Esther said she would explain if he and Haman would come to a feast that she prepared the following evening. When the grand banquet was over King Xerxes asked once again. And so it was that Esther's name will be forever be remembered for her willingness to risk everything in the **service** of her people.






# Service with a smile






# HALL OF FAME

### JK Rowling OBE

The OBE, Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, is an honour and medal awarded to

# Storrington Rotary help school with music lessons

The pandemic has been a real challenge for the children of St Mary's Primary School, Pulborough, whose eldest pupils have missed a block of musical instrument playing due to remote learning.

Last year the school ran a 10 week Ukulele music course for 100 pupils from Years 5 and 6 which had a positive impact on the children's mental health, enjoyment of the curriculum and also improved their musical skills.

To continue the children's musical progress and well being, the <u>Rotary Club</u> has provided funding to support another block of lessons starting this week.

Another term of training would mean that the children could become fluent in playing pieces of music and give them the level of knowledge to continue to play on their own.

Headteacher Samantha Copus said: "We are so grateful to the Rotary Club for their support: the children cheered when they found out that the lessons would continue, due to the enjoyment, confidence and musical knowledge that they have developed."

Each day we will offer at least 3 activities, the above is a guideline and subject to change at short notice.

#### Activities:

**Paddlesports**: Canoe (2-3 person), kayak (single) or stand-up paddle boarding (single). Dependent on the tide. Water sports are offered at high tide only. Please note that this is weather dependent, particularly in winter months.

Low Ropes: Obstacle course 1-2m off the ground.

Mountain Biking: All bikes and helmets provided, although you're welcome to bring your own. Biking on nearby recreational field or surrounding areas such as the tow path to Bramber.

Orienteering: simple activities with a map and compass in and around the centre and on the recreational field

Bush Craft: activities such as fire lighting, cooking food on the fire, purifying water, shelter making and bush craft skills.

Climbing: Indoor climbing wall

Target Shooting: air rifle targets in a range within the grounds of the centre

Team Games: Ball games or capture the flag in the ground or on the recreational field.

Problem solving: Learning to solve problems as a team, sometimes as a competition against other teams.

Multi Activity session: combining several of the above for smaller time sessions but covering more activities.

MTA: Giant Meccano building



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
